Risk Assessment

B9 What are the Risk Assessment implications:

B9.1 Positive (Opportunities/Benefits):

- Leveraging external LEVI funding to expand EV charging infrastructure in the borough at a minimal cost to ESBC.
- Demonstrating leadership in enabling the transition to cleaner vehicles, supporting the Council's climate change and air quality objectives.
- Opportunity to support residents without off-street parking in accessing EV charging, promoting fairness and inclusivity in the transition to electric vehicles.
- Reduced financial and operational risk for ESBC by having SCC manage the charging infrastructure and contracts.

B9.2 Negative (Threats):

- If agreements are not signed, the shortlist of ESBC car park sites will not be included as locations for LEVI-funded installation. This could delay the rollout of EV charging in the borough and mean missing out on the current funding opportunity.
- If there are delays to the proposed timeline, 10% of Staffordshire County Council's LEVI funding (£458,800) expected in March 2025 may not be received leaving a shortfall in the budget for the project.
- Lack of uptake or usage of the new charging points could mean they are not financially viable for the operator. Robust feasibility assessments and ongoing monitoring of usage levels by the CPO will be required to mitigate this.
- Reputational risk to ESBC if there are issues with the availability, reliability
 or pricing of the charging points. Clear SLAs on performance and
 customer service standards will need to be agreed upon with the CPO,
 along with effective contract management.
- It is also worth noting that, if ESBC does not provide EV charging points then customers will gravitate towards those car parks that do have them,

and therefore risk losing clients should we not provide them. With the introduction of EV points, we may boost our customer base by providing the facilities modern-day drivers expect.

Environmental Impact

B11.3 Positive Impacts (Opportunities/Benefits):

- The installation of electric vehicle charge points would directly contribute to reducing carbon emissions across the District and assist with reducing some air pollutants, principally Nitrogen Dioxide, that cause a reduction in air quality.
- Supporting the public availability of EV charge point infrastructure is vital for enabling the uptake of cleaner fuel technology for road vehicles.

- Increased carbon cost of administering projects. While the initiatives
 outlined aim to reduce carbon emissions overall, there may be some
 increased emissions associated with administering and coordinating the
 projects. For example, emissions from staff travel, procurement of
 materials/services, and disposal of waste.
- However, steps can be taken to minimise these emissions such as:
 - Promoting remote working and virtual meetings to reduce staff travel
 - Ensuring offices/buildings used are energy efficient and powered by renewables
 - Procuring sustainably prioritising local sourcing, recycled materials, energy-efficient equipment etc.
 - Managing waste effectively reducing, reusing and recycling wherever possible
- The sustainability gains from the successful delivery of each initiative are anticipated to outweigh these administrative emissions. But it is still important to be mindful of them and take mitigating steps where possible. Measuring, reporting and offsetting residual emissions should also be considered.
