B1 What is the Decision?	 Following correspondence from the Minister at Appendix 1, the 'Rough Sleeping Initiative 5' (RSI5) will commence on 1 July 2021, and current funding arrangements will apply at 75% from 1 April 2022 until 30 June 2022. Therefore pending the outcome of the RSI5 funding application, the Council needs to: Divert £10,787.00 from the Council's Homeless Prevention Grant¹ to offset the 25% funding cuts in Q1 of 2022/23. Extend the Emergency Bed Spaces for a further 3 months until 30 June 2022 Extend the Navigator Service for a further 3 months until 30 June 2022 Extend the Housing First Intervention for a further 3 months until 30 June 2022
B2 What are the reasons for the Decision?	The measures detailed above are currently in operation, and have been shown to be effective with the most recent rough sleeper count producing a result of zero. ² There is a shortfall of 25% in the level of RSI funds previously provided for the equivalent level of service.

 Whilst the listed projects have been vital to the reduction in rough sleeping, there are a number of other important factors.

B5 What are the financial implications?

The main financial issues arising from this decision are as follows:

- DLUHC has guaranteed funding for existing interventions at 75% from 1 April 2022 to 30 June 2022, this will automatically be paid to the Council in April 2022 according to the 20 December 2021 letter from Eddie Hughes, Minister for Rough Sleeping and Housing.
- The Council has been awarded £269,527 from the Homeless Prevention Grant for 2022/23. No grant conditions have yet been issued, though the terms per the letter received do not appear to now prohibit the use of £10,787 on rough sleeper interventions to replace the missing 25% of funding for Q1.

Assumptions:

- The anticipated additional supplement to potential RSI funding shortfall in 2022/23 expenditure is based on the current service providers for the Housing First, Navigator Service and Emergency Beds Bed Spaces extending contracts based on current prices and demand.
- DLUHC guaranteed funding is based on the cost of provision of service and not funding received.
- The surge capacity funding demand varies in line with factors outside of the control of the council. The estimates used above are in line with those on which the previous RSI4 award was based but may not reflect the actual demand experienced.
- The service agreement will state that the service provider will only receive payment when the funding is received from the MHCLG.
- The revenue will be provided by the MHCLG pursuant to sections 31(3) and 31(4) of the Local Government Act 2003.
