## 1. Purpose of the Report

1.1. To report on the responses to consultation and make recommendations in respect of the review of polling districts and polling places, and to seek approval of such.

## 2. Executive Summary

2.1. The Council is required to undertake a compulsory review of Polling Districts, Polling Places and Polling Stations every five years with a view to establishing their suitability. There is no requirement to change any of the current arrangements but any 'no change' decision must be fully justified as part of the overall proposals.

## 3. Background

3.1. Section 18C (1) of the Representation of the People Act 1983 (as amended by section 17 of the Electoral Registration and Administration Act 2013), places a duty on all Local Authorities to review all UK Parliamentary Polling Districts and polling places in their area at least once every five years.

3.1.1. The Council's current scheme of polling districts and places was adopted following a full review during 2020/21 and were implemented in 2023 when the new ward boundaries for the Borough took effect.

## 4. Contribution to Corporate Priorities

4.1. This review contributes to the Corporate Plan objective *Improving Local Democracy*.

# 5. Report

- 5.1. The formal consultation period ran from 2 October to 30 November 2023.
  - 5.1.1. A public notice giving notice of the review was placed on the Council's website and at Burton Town Hall. In addition, specific consultations were undertaken on the existing scheme of polling districts and places with comments being sought from the relevant Returning Officers, all East Staffordshire Borough Councillors, parish/town councils, political parties, Staffordshire County Council and groups with a particular interest and expertise in relation to access to premises for persons who have different forms of disability. These parties were informed of the review via email.
  - 5.1.2. The responses to the consultation are set out in **Appendix A** to this report.
  - 5.1.3. The appendix provides details of the polling district, ward and polling place and sets out any specific comments received in response to the consultation and identifies any action proposed.
  - 5.1.4. A number of schools are currently used for polling stations in the area and the Council's aim to seek alternative premises is ongoing. The schools which remain on the list for future use are the only suitable premises in those areas and therefore will continue to be used.
  - 5.1.5. As can be seen from the appendix, the response to the consultation has been limited. It is disappointing to note that no response has been received from members of the public nor from organisations representing people with disabilities.
  - 5.1.6. Four Parish Councils have commented. Two, Croxden & Mayfield, are happy with the current arrangements. However 2 councils have made representations, as follows:

- 5.1.6.1. Uttoxeter Town Council have indicated that residents from one street would prefer to vote at the Town Hall in Uttoxeter instead of the Heath Community Centre.
- 5.1.6.2. Stretton Parish Council are concerned that the Priory Centre is very busy on Election Day. They are also against the use of Outwoods Primary School as a Polling Station.
- 5.1.7. Following each Election Presiding Officers and Polling Station Inspectors provide a risk assessment of each Polling Place and consideration is given to their observations. This approach is not intended to eliminate all risks and not all risks identified can be managed all of the time. Also risks will still exist which have not been identified. However, based on the information provided, it is the officers' opinion that the significant risks have been identified, assessed and arrangements are in place to manage them effectively.
- 5.1.8. The impact over the next four years with regard to residential development has been examined in relation to the current provision of polling places/stations. It is considered that the immediate growth will be predominately in Burton and surrounding area, but there is significant development planned for Uttoxeter. However it is considered that there will be sufficient capacity in the existing polling places/stations, although in the longer term it may be necessary to increase the number of polling staff assigned to some of the polling stations.
- 5.2. The polling districts/places and stations in the affected wards will be kept under review and it is recommended that reviews be carried out on a more frequent basis than the statutory five yearly cycle.

#### 6. Financial Considerations

6.1. There will be no increase in hire costs by using the Polling Stations listed. Currently in the Borough the cheapest Polling Station costs £35 to hire and the most expensive is £700.

Polling places have already been accessed for accessibility when they are hired for voting. This process is ongoing, both Polling Station Inspectors and Polling Station Staff are asked at the time of each Election if the premises remain suitable.
